

Desper and Scottie Creeks

Day or overnight trips possible. Flows into the Chisana 50 Small, clear, slow moving streams with Alaska Hwy access at mileposts 1223 and 1225, up to 17 miles long. miles above Northway.

Chisana River

started on Desper Creek. Boat launch off Alaska Hwy at milepost 1246, to access Tanana River (see below) or Creek, up to 55 miles long. Good 4-6 day (70 mi) trip if Large, fast, glacier fed river with no rapids below Scottie motor upstream.

Nabesna River


