- The Matanuska Glacier State Recreation Site, near Matanuska Glacier
- Nancy Lake State Recreation Area, near Willow

Denali State Park (near Trapper Creek)

Denali State Park borders the southeast corner of Denali National Park, providing wonderful views of the south side of Denali (formerly Mt. McKinley). The George Parks Highway bisects the state park.

The entrance to Denali National Park is approximately 90 miles north of the Denali State Park. Temperatures in the summer are usually in the 60's, with rare highs in the 80's. However, have warm clothes and quality rain gear, as inclement weather can set in quickly and last for days. Average winter highs range from zero to 30°F, while on extremely cold days the low may reach minus 40°F. Snow begins to accumulate in October and frequently reaches depths of six feet or more.

K'esugi Ken Campground Cabins

These beautiful log cabins were Alaskan-built in 2016 as part of the first phase of the South Denali Project (/parks/sdenali/index.htm). Future plans will eventually include a visitor center on Curry Ridge. Each cabin has a wood stove, table, benches, and built-in wood sleeping bunks. No mattresses, bedding, or cookware are provided.

Getting There - K'esugi Ken Campground is located at MP 135.4 George Parks Highway. Follow the highway signs to the entrance road. K'esugi Ken Road is two miles long up a curvy hill. All-wheel drive vehicles are recommended during winter months. The cabins are located within the Tent Campground loop.

Important Information

- Winter in Denali country is great for snow recreation, but storms can create hazardous conditions. Be prepared in case snow-bound occurs as road clearing make take a few days. Check into weather conditions prior to driving to the park. Bring extra food.
- Water is available from hand pumps in the campground during the spring, summer and fall months. No water is available during winter months plan on bringing your own.
- A vaulted toilet is available nearby.
- Let someone know where you are going and when you expect to return. Most cell phones work at the cabins.
- Cabins may only be used by those who paid the rental fee in advance, and only on the days specified on the receipt. You must have your receipt/permit with you during your stay.
- Cabins may not be used for commercial activities.
- Cabins may be closed due to weather, maintenance problems, break-up, ice conditions, or other reasons.

What to do

K'esugi Ken Campground was constructed in 2016 and includes a recreational vehicle (RV) loop and a walk-in tent loop. The 33-site RV loop can accommodate up to 36 foot vehicles and there are electrical hookups at all campsites. The 10-site tent campground loop includes tables, fireplaces and food storage lockers at each site. Campsites are beautifully landscaped, offer privacy and some have outstanding views of Denali and the Alaska Range. There is a picnic pavilion in the tent loop and a large group campsite that can accommodate groups of up to 50. All sites in both loops are ADA accessible.

NOTE: The campgrounds are closed for the winter and are scheduled to open on May 26 2017.

Trails: There are 2 miles of walking/biking trails through the campground area. The newly built 2-mile Curry Ridge Trail offers hiking or skiing up to the lower bench of Curry Ridge and Lake 1787. More information on this trail will be coming soon.

Cross-Country Skiing: The walking trails and campground roads are groomed for cc skiing, both Nordic and skate-skiing.

Snowmobiling: The groomed winter ski trails are closed to snowmobiles, but areas are open to ride north to Troublesome Creek and beyond. Snowmobiles are allowed for general access to the cabins when sufficient snow is available. When the Chulitna River freezes well, crossing it opens vast expanses to riding in the foothills of the Alaska Range, and the groomed snowmobile trails in the Bunco Lake/Peters hills area. Offroad vehicles are prohibited in Denali State Park.

Hunting: The use and discharge of a weapon for the purpose of lawful hunting or trapping is allowed in Denali State Park, except within one-half mile of a developed facility (K'esugi Ken Campgrounds) or within a quarter mile of the George Parks Highway between mile 132 and 170.

Firewood: May be available to purchase on site; it is recommended to bring at least 4 bundles (available at gas stations, etc.) for the first night. Check the website for current firewood availability at http://dnr.alaska.gov/parks/asp/curevnts.htm (/parks/asp/curevnts.htm).

• Hunter Cabin, Site #1 (16' X 20') -- See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 8) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Parking is available at Campsite #1 in the tent campground. Winter parking may be designated nearby depending on snow depths. Cabin has a full campsite adjacent including a tent pad, fire-ring, food storage locker and picnic table (for cabin renters only). Charcoal or hibachi-type grills may only be used in the outdoor fire-ring. Four double-sized (43"x78") plywood bunk platforms can sleep up to 8 people, 4-6 comfortably, plus a small table and benches. The 16'x10' loft is accessed by spiral stairs and is extra space for sleeping on the floor or gear storage. All cabins are equipped with covered decks, wood stoves, table, benches, broom and snow shovel. A combination lock provides security on one door (combination provided upon reservation). Vaulted toilets are nearby. Includes an outdoor deck with a spectacular view of Denali and the Alaska Range. All cabins are ADA accessible.



• Tokosha Cabin, Site #2 (16' X 20') -- See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 8) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Parking is available at Campsite #2 in the tent campground. Winter parking may be designated nearby depending on snow depths. Cabin has a full campsite adjacent including a tent pad, fire-ring, food storage locker and picnic table (for cabin renters only). Charcoal or hibachi-type grills may only be used in the outdoor fire-ring. Four double-sized (43"x78") plywood bunk platforms can sleep up to 8 people, 4-6 comfortably, plus a small table and benches. The 16'x10' loft is accessed by spiral stairs and is extra space for sleeping on the floor or gear storage. All cabins are equipped with covered decks, wood stoves, table, benches, broom and snow shovel. A combination lock provides security on one door (combination provided upon reservation). Vaulted toilets are nearby. Includes an outdoor deck with a spectacular view of Denali and the Alaska Range. All cabins are ADA accessible.

• Denali Cabin #3 (24' X 30') -- See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 8 (maximum 10) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Parking is available at the Campground Host Site in the tent campground. Note that the host's RV will be parked nearby during summer months. Winter parking may be designated nearby depending on snow depths. It includes an outside fire ring and picnic table, plus a table and benches inside. The cabin has limited electricity for lights and small accessories (electric heaters or hotplates will not work). Bringing alternate lighting is recommended, power outages are frequent. A small bedroom has one 60"x80" wood sleeping platform. The 20'x12' loft is accessed by spiral stairs and is extra space for sleeping on the floor or gear. The cabin sleeps up to 12 people. All cabins are equipped with covered decks, wood stoves, table, benches, broom and snow shovel. A combination lock provides security on one door (combination provided upon reservation). Vaulted toilets are nearby.All cabins are ADA accessible.

Byers Lake Cabins

Byers Lake, located at Mile 147 of the Parks Highway, has a number of park facilities, including cabins, a campground and Kesugi Ridge Trailhead.

Byers Lake Cabin #2

Summer activities include hiking, fishing, hunting, camping, and boating (gas-powered motors are not allowed on Byers Lake). Winter activities include cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, dog mushing, and snowmobiling. The road into Byers Lake Campground is not plowed in the winter. Check http://dnr.alaska.gov/parks/asp/curevnts.htm (/parks/asp/curevnts.htm) for current snow and ice conditions. Groomed ski trails may be available when snow conditions are favorable. Visitors and cabin renters must park their vehicles at the Alaska Veterans Memorial and follow the winter trail down to the lake.

Byers Lake Cabin #3 Maximum stay in the public use cabins is 5 consecutive nights. Each cabin has a wood heating stove, bunks, tables, and benches. In the summer, water is supplied by the campground pump or purifying lake water; in the winter, renters must bring their own, or purify lake water or snow. In winter make sure the chimney is free of snow before starting a fire. If you would like to bring in a small generator, Byers Lake

Cabin #3 is wired for electricity. Please bring spare lightbulbs. Firewood is not provided at the cabins. Either bring your own, or arrive at the cabin with enough daylight to find firewood. Wood must be dead and down. Firewood may be available for sale at the new Kesugi-Ken Campground. • Byers Lake Cabin #1 (12' X 16') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Summer access: gravel road for one mile from highway. Winter access: Park at the Alaska Veteran's Memorial, milepost 147.1, Parks Highway, and follow the marked winter trail with snow vehicle, skis, dog sled, or on foot. At the bottom of the hill near the lake, take the left hand fork - total distance is one mile. This hand-crafted, sod-roofed log cabin is a true example of a traditional Alaskan bush cabin.

• Byers Lake Cabin #2 (12' X 16') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Summer access: one-half mile walk from the gate in the campground, or canoe one-half mile from boat launch. Winter access: Park at the Alaska Veteran's Memorial, milepost 147.1, Parks Highway, and follow the marked winter trail with snow vehicle, skis, dog sled, or on foot. At the bottom of the hill near the lake, take the right hand fork - total distance is 1.7 mile.

• Byers Lake Cabin #3 (14' X 20') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Summer access: one-half mile walk from the gate in the campground, or canoe one-half mile from boat launch. Winter access: Park at the Alaska Veteran's Memorial, milepost 147.1, Parks Highway, and follow the marked winter trail with snow vehicle, skis, dog

sled, or on foot. At the bottom of the hill near the lake, take the right hand fork. The Cabin is about 70 yards. south from Cabin #2.

Matanuska Glacier

The Matanuska Glacier State Recreation Site, managed by Long Rifle Lodge, is located one mile south of the Lodge at Mile 101 on the Glenn Highway National Scenic Byway (http://www.byways.org/browse/byways/2483/). The recreation site has 9 campsites on a gravel loop road, water pump, toilets, fire pits, and picnic tables. The Edge Nature Trail begins at the rest area and provides a 20-minute walk through the forest to glacier viewing platforms. Summer activities include hiking, glacier trekking and river rafting. Winter activities include skiing, snowshoeing and snowmachining. NOTE: There is no access to the Matanuska Glacier from the park.

• Matanuska Glacier Cabin(16'x20' with a 6' porch) Sleeps 4 (4 person maximum) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). This log cabin has outstanding views overlooking the Matanuska Glacier, the valley below the glacier and the Chugach Mountains. The cabin has electric lights, double beds (no linens), a woodstove, table and chairs. Outdoors are the toilet, a picnic table and fire-ring. The cabin is road accessible year-round. Water is available in summer at the well in the campground nearby; renters need to bring their own water in the winter. Cabin key can be picked up at Long Rifle Lodge any time after noon the day of your reservation. Checkout time is noon. Nancy Lake State Recreation Area is one of Alaska's few flat, lake-studded landscapes preserved in its natural state for recreation. Lakes, streams, and swamps make up just over half of this 22,685 acre area which lies between the Susitna River on the west and the Talkeetna Mountains on the east. The setting is great for canoeing, hiking, fishing, and camping. In winter, the rolling topography is ideal for cross-country skiing, dog-mushing, and snowmachining.

Nancy Lake State Recreation Area is a 75 minute drive north of Anchorage. The community of Willow lies just north of the recreation area entrance at Mile 67.3 of the Parks Highway, and has a full range of services nearby for the traveler. The Nancy Lake Public Use Cabins are located on four of the larger lakes in the recreation area and are accessible by canoe, foot, or floatplane, in the summer, and skis, dog sled, snow vehicles, or airplane in winter. Planes can land on Nancy, Lynx, and Red Shirt lakes year round. In the winter, check ice thickness reports with the local state park office.

The weather in southcentral Alaska during the summer is mild. Temperatures rise into the 70's with occasional highs in the 80's. Nighttime readings, even in July, may dip into the 40's. Winter temperatures can fall to -40F and seldom rise above freezing until mid-March. Come prepared for the outdoors and rapid weather changes. Bring warm clothing, rain gear, appropriate footwear, extra food, and emergency gear.

In the recreation area's combination of lakes, one can find an abundance of wildlife. Fish include rainbow and lake trout, whitefish, northern pike (especially at Red Shirt and Lynx Lakes) and Dolly Varden. Common loons, Pacific loons, grebes, and Arctic terns also make their home in the recreation area. Please give all nesting sites of these birds a wide berth when canoeing or hiking. Beaver, moose, and bears are also common in this area so keep a lookout and follow the bear safety tips (/parks/safety/bears.htm).

Please report any bear sightings to the park staff.

Canoes are available for rent from (http://www.paddlealaska.com/index_files/Page340.htm)Tippecanoe Rentals in Willow. Call to have one waiting for you at one of the trailheads or lakes (907-355-6687).

Cabins within the Nancy Lake State Recreation Area are rustic. Many are insulated frame buildings and are equipped with wooden sleeping platforms, shelves, tables, a wood-burning stove (for heating only), and chairs or benches. Three older cabins were replaced in 2015 with new 16 x 20 foot log cabins. See below for details. All cabins have a latrine and outdoor fire pit. It is highly recommended that you bring your own firewood, dead and down trees are scarce in the area. Cutting live trees in illegal within the park. The water supply is from the lakes. Please be sure to purify the water before using it. The cabins are generally the same, except for size and location.

Access for the cabins on Nancy Lake is similar except for Cabin #3 (see below).

• Nancy Lake Cabin #1 (16' X 20') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). GPS 61 41.572N, 150 01.239W.

The cabin was replaced in 2015 with a new larger log cabin. Located a stone's throw from Nancy Lake, the site is most easily accessed from the water. It is a short 1/4-mile paddle by canoe, ski or snowmobile from the Nancy Lake Canoe Trailhead parking area at Mile 1.6 Nancy Lake Parkway. It can also be accessed at the Public Use Cabin Trailhead at Mile 1.8 Nancy Lake Parkway;

follow the signs 1/2-mile trail to the cabin. Floats or ski-plane accessible. **NOTE SEPTEMBER 2016**: The steep hill on the cabin trail has been re-routed with a much gentler grade, suitable for hiking, skiing or snowmobiling. The cabin has 2 double bunks, a storage loft, outside picnic table, fireplace and overlooks scenic Nancy Lake.

• Nancy Lake Cabin #2 (16' X 20') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 8) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). GPS N 61 41.420' W 150 01.267' (WGS84 Datum)

Nancy Lake Cabin #2 was replaced with a brand new log cabin in 2016, and moved to an upland birch forest 1/2 mile by trail from the old cabin site. The easiest access is via a trail starting from the Nancy Lake Public Use Cabin Trailhead at Mile 1.8 Nancy Lake Parkway; follow the signs along the 1/3-mile trail to the cabin. Note that the new cabin is still accessible from the lake, however it is located upland and not directly on the shore. The new cabin overlooks scenic Nancy Lake and has 2 bunk beds, a storage loft, outside picnic table, and fireplace.

• Nancy Lake Cabin #3 (16' X 16') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). Summer access: this cabin is surrounded by private property and can only be reached by boat or floatplane. Winter access: use the winter trail on the lake (one mile) by snow vehicle, airplane, skis, snowshoes, or dog sled. GPS 61 41.284N, 150 00.895W.

• Nancy Lake Cabin #4 (24' X 24') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 8 (maximum 8) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). This cabin has a large covered front porch and is great for families. GPS 61 41.248N, 150 01.286W.

• Bald Lake Cabin (16' X 24') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). This cabin has a six foot porch and is the only building on the lake. GPS 61 40.915N, 150 02.093W. Access for the Bald Lake cabin is a quarter-mile walking trail. The trailhead is at Mile 2.5 of the Nancy Lake Parkway. There is a well-marked trail and signs that lead you to the cabin, located on the north end of the lake. In the winter, park at the Winter Trailhead parking lot (Mile 2.2 of the Nancy Lake Parkway). Using registered snowmobiles, skis, snowshoes, or dog sled, travel the unplowed portion of the parkway 0.3 miles. Floats or ski-plane accessible. ATVs prohibited. Take a left at the summer parking area and follow the trail and signs leading to the cabin. There is also a trail leading from the cabin to the lake.

Summer access for the cabins on Lynx Lake and James Lake is via the canoe trail system. The canoe trail involves Bald Lake Cabin crossing several lakes and portages between lakes for about 3-4 miles to reach the cabins and takes approximately half a day. Lynx Lake cabins are also accessible by floatplane in the summer. Winter access is by registered snowmobile, skis, snowshoe, or dog sled using the winter trail. ATVs prohibited. Distance varies between 3.5 to 6.0 miles, depending on route and cabin. Lynx Lake cabins can also be reached by plane in the winter. No planes are allowed on James Lake. None of the cabins on Lynx or James Lakes are reachable during freeze up or break up when the ice is too thin to support weight.

• James Lake Cabin (16' X 24') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). No planes are allowed on James Lake. This is a true log cabin. It is also the most isolated, secluded cabin in the Nancy Lake recreation system. GPS 61 38.107N, 150 05.700W.

• Lynx Lake Cabin #1 (12' X 12') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 4 (maximum 4) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). This cabin is very cozy for two and has a view of Denali and MT. Foraker across the lake. GPS 61 38.365N, 150 02.985W.

• Lynx Lake Cabin #2 (16' X 20') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 4 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). GPS 61 37.947N, 150 03.113W.

Lynx Lake Cabins 2 & 3 have been recently replaced with new log cabins. Both cabins are identical inside. The two cabins are approximately 200 feet from each other making them good choices for multiple groups wanting to stay close to each other. Each cabin has a trail to Lynx Lake that is approximately 300 feet away. The cabins can also be reached overland near Mile 12 Lynx Lake Road. Note that this rough, unmaintained road is closed to highway vehicles at Mile 6 during summer months. Access beyond the gate is hike-in only. During the winter, the road is not plowed and may be traversed by ski, snowshoe, dog sled or snowmachine.

• Lynx Lake Cabin #3 (16' X 20') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 4 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). GPS 61 37.911N, 150 03.145W.

Lynx Lake Cabins 2 & 3 have been recently replaced with new log cabins. Both cabins are identical inside. The two cabins are approximately 200 feet from each other making them good choices for multiple groups wanting to stay close to each other. Each cabin has a trail to Lynx Lake that is approximately 300 feet away. The cabins can also be reached overland near Mile 12 Lynx Lake Road. Note that this rough, unmaintained road is closed to highway vehicles at Mile 6 during summer months. Access beyond the gate is hike-in only. During the winter, the road is not plowed and may be traversed by ski, snowshoe, dog sled or snowmachine.

Red Shirt Cabin #2 Access for the cabins on Red Shirt Lake is similar to Lynx Lake. Summer access: by floatplane or by a combination of hiking and canoeing. It is a 3 mile hike to Red Shirt Lake from the summer Red Shirt Lake trailhead at the end of Nancy Lake Parkway, followed by crossing the lake to reach a cabin. A canoe must be carried to Red Shirt or rent one from (tippe.htm)Tippecanoe Rentals (907-495-6688) prior to departure and they will have a canoe at the lake for you. Winter access: by plane or the winter trail for 7.5 to 8 miles, using registered snowmobile, skis, snowshoes, or dog sled. ATVs prohibited. None of the cabins on Red Shirt Lake are reachable during freeze up or break up when the ice is too thin to support weight.

• Red Shirt Lake Cabin #1 (20' X 24') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 7 (maximum 7) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). This cabin is on an island a short distance from the shore near the trail end at Red Shirt Lake. GPS 61 38.286N, 150 10.161W.

• Red Shirt Lake Cabin #2 (12' X 12') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 6 (maximum 6) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). The cabin sits on the lake shore. There is no trail connecting the cabin to the trail system, so access is by the lake. GPS 61 38.161N, 150 09.658W.

• Red Shirt Lake Cabin #3 (16' X 24') See Cabin Availability

Sleeps 8 (maximum 8) with a maximum stay of 5 consecutive nights. See Fee Page for rates (/parks/asp/unitfees.htm#matsucab). This cabin is on an island in the middle of the lake - a different island from cabin #1. It is elevated, and has a good view of the lake. GPS 61 38.186N, 150 09.543W.

• Red Shirt Lake Cabin #4 (12' X 28') See Cabin Availability
